State Cancer Profiles provides a system to **characterize the cancer burden in a standardized manner** in order to motivate action, integrate surveillance into cancer control planning, characterize areas and demographic groups, and expose health disparities.

Written **Tutorials** assist you in learning how to use tables and graphs with step-by-step instructions. The **Quick Reference Guides** offer visual explanations on how to use the tables and graphs. Other resources include **Table and Graph Descriptions**, **Dictionary of Terms**, **Frequently Asked Questions**, and **Data Use Restrictions**.

New Video Series: Informing the Public about Key Cancer Statistics

Did You Know? Video Series provides two to three-minute informational videos on various cancer topics. The videos communicate key statistical data on different types of cancers to a lay audience in understandable, clear, and concise language. Each video also provides background information on cancer types and risk factors, and encourages action when appropriate. The data and information shown in this series comes from **SEER**, the **Annual Report to the Nation on the Status of Cancer**, **gis.cancer.gov**, **cancer.gov** and other government sources including **CDC**.

What the task forces are up to...

Priority 6: Increase HPV vaccination rates. *Chaired by [Stacie Fredenburg](#)*

The task force is working to implement its action plan, which focuses on three priority strategies: health professional education, policy and systems change and school vaccination programs. Efforts moving forward will primarily focus on hosting a roundtable event for health care professionals targeted at determining priority strategies for increasing HPV vaccination. South Dakota also submitted an application to attend the HPV Vaccination Workshop in Atlanta, GA. Selected teams will be notified around February 29, 2016. If selected, four team members are required to attend: the CCC Program Director, an immunization program representative, an ACS representative and an HPV health system champion.

Priority 7: Increase risk-appropriate screening for breast cancer. *Chaired by [Mary Kolsrud](#)*

The task force is working to develop a short video and one-page handout for health care professionals that promote professional guidelines and availability of funding for low-income women for breast and cervical cancer screening. In partnership with the SD Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening Program, the SD CCCP plans to release an RFA targeting health systems interested in focusing on increasing breast and cervical cancer screening through evidence-based intervention implementation and policy and system changes. The RFA is expected to be released in March.

Priority 9: Increase risk-appropriate screening for colorectal cancer. *Chaired by [Jill Ireland](#)*

The colorectal task force is coordinating the implementation of the 80% by 2018 Forum action plan and serving as a convener of interested stakeholders and distributor of best practices.

Priority 12: Increase participation in cancer clinical trials. *Co-Chaired by [Charlene Berke](#) and [Lora Black](#)*

The task force is working to complete the clinical trials partnership project with USD that was awarded to the treatment workgroup. The three videos are anticipated to be complete by March. The task force will lead the dissemination efforts for these resources.

Priority 14: Improve availability of palliative and end-of-life care services. *Chaired by [Lexi Haux](#)*

The palliative care task force is working to promote interprofessional palliative care education within SD cancer treatment centers. The Cancer Center Services Brief was developed in partnership with SDSU. The purpose of this report is to describe the services offered to cancer patients at the cancer centers in South Dakota, including patient navigation, palliative care and advance care planning.



Lung Cancer Screening Programs – Policies and Practices for Cancer Prevention Released

The purpose of this brief is to describe how NCCCCP grantees can increase awareness about lung cancer screening programs, including cigarette smoking cessation, for persons at high risk for lung cancer. It includes links to websites with information about cigarette smoking cessation and lung cancer screening, as well as a list of potential partners to engage in lung cancer screening program efforts.


Spotlight On...CDC's Division of Cancer Prevention and Control

CDC is a leader in nationwide efforts to ease the burden of cancer. Through the Division of Cancer Prevention and Control (DCPC), CDC works with national cancer organizations, state health agencies, and other key groups to develop, implement, and promote effective strategies for preventing and controlling cancer.

The SD DOH currently has cooperative agreements with the DCPC for five cancer related programs: Cancer Registry, Comprehensive Cancer Control, SD Survivorship Program, Breast & Cervical Early Detection Program and Colorectal Cancer Program.

The division recently released [DCPC Works!](#) — a two-page infographic on 2015 Program Priorities, Collaborations, Publications and Communications. Highlights include:

- ◆ Almost 60,000 people enrolled and screened in 6-year grant cycle Colorectal Cancer Control Program (CRCCP)
- ◆ 31 grantees are expanding to support healthcare providers in adopting practices proven to increase colorectal cancer screening
- ◆ 179,533 women screened for cervical cancer National Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program (NBCCEDP)
- ◆ 1.5 million cancer cases—National Program of Cancer registries collected data
- ◆ 11 state teams participated in the 80% by 2018 training forum to get targeted support to increase their states' colorectal cancer screening percentage to 80% by 2018



Lung Cancer Monograph

The South Dakota Department of Health's SD Tobacco Control Program and the SD Cancer Registry released the [2016 Monograph: Lung Cancer in South Dakota](#). The lung cancer monograph notes that in 2015, South Dakota expects 570 new lung and bronchus cancer cases and 450 deaths due to this cancer. During the same time an estimated 221,200 lung and bronchus cancer cases and 158,040 lung and bronchus cancer deaths are projected for the United States.

During 2009-2013, there was an average of 559 (298 men and 261 women) new cases of lung and bronchus cancer diagnosed among South Dakota residents per year. Of those cases, the white population averaged 517 cases and the American Indian population 38 cases. In South Dakota, an average of 425 people died annually from lung cancer spanning the years from 2009 to 2013. Of that number, 396 were white and 26 were American Indian.

CDC's New Gynecologic Cancer Curriculum

CDC developed a new e-learning curriculum about the risk factors, symptoms, prevention strategies and screening recommendations of gynecologic cancers. The curriculum, intended for primary health care professionals, consists of six modules that address gynecologic cancers including cervical, ovarian, uterine, vaginal, and vulvar cancers. 

Sanford SemiColon


